- Program:** Ala Costa is an after school learning center for students residing of Alameda or Contra Costa Counties with developmental disabilities ages 6 to 22. The program was founded in 1972 by a small group of parents who wanted a safe place for their children to go after school. Now the program is open 250 days per year with a professional staff of 50 at two sites, one in Berkeley and the other in Oakland. Classrooms are team lead with a 1:5 staff to student ratio and 1:3 for students with personal care and/or behavior challenges. The focus is on providing age appropriate lessons and activities designed to help students develop skills in independent living, mobility, fine arts, expressive and receptive language, functional academics, social interaction, and vocational readiness.
- Cost:** Funding is provided through Regional Center of the East Bay (a share of cost may apply), the City of Berkeley, the California Department of Education, and the Oakland Fund for Children and Youth. Other fees may apply for the cost of activities, community outings, and community lunches.

**Program:** Boys and Girls Clubs can be found in communities throughout the United States. You can find a Boys and Girls Club near you in Napa, St. Helena, Vallejo, Cloverdale, Healdsburg, Rohnert Park, Santa Rosa, Sonoma Valley, Winsor, and Valley of the Moon. They all offer a safe place for children to be during the day, a place to go after school and, at times local excursions.

The Boys and Girls Club of St. Helena is open year-round from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. They also have a "Rising Club" program from 7:45 to 10:00. Parents must register, but once a member, children can be dropped off any time the club is open. St. Helena has a games room with pool, board and card games. They have a homework room and an art room with a variety of staff-led art projects. During the school year the time at the Boys and Girls Club is largely unstructured in order to give the children a much needed break. In the summer, the children are organized by age for participation in a series of fun activities throughout the day. The Summer Program may also include fun outings such as Marine World, Water World, Willies Water Skiing School and similar destinations.

**Cost:** St. Helena has a \$40 membership each school year and \$40 membership each summer. The Rising Sun Program is an additional \$6.00 per day. Children must be able to participate appropriately in a group of about 30 other children and be self-sufficient in self-care activities.

**Program:** Napa's only Multi-Media Computer Clubhouse, exclusively for KIDS 9 years of age and over. They offer after school, spring, and summer programs. There are 31 multi-media computers with ultra fast internet connections. Kids learn to create cool graphics for the web, print or create movies using Adobe, Macromedia, and other software. Children can explore their artistic abilities while building multi-media skills through hands-on project-based lessons and workshops. Volunteer mentors are recruited for some children who require additional assistance completing the self-paced lessons and workshops.

CyberMill produced the "Napa Valley Mayor's Committee on Disabilities" video and "First Hand," a video created using digital story telling to introduce viewers to four people with disabilities. Both projects were efforts to use the power of digital technology to build a more inclusive and compassionate community.

## What Does Your Child's School Have to Offer?

---

Many schools throughout Napa, Solano and Sonoma Counties have programs that provide fun things to do after school, before school, and on week-ends. Descriptions of available programs can often be found just outside or just inside the school Office. They also provide an avenue for parents to learn about other non-school programs offered in the area. Here is a description of some of the materials available just outside the office of a local school we visited. Check your child's local school to see what you can find.

**After-School Art Programs** generally take place a few hours per week for approximately 6 weeks. For the one we found students bring their own sketching pencil, eraser and paper AND watercolors, brush and paper. The fee for this program was \$90 for 6 classes.

**A Children's Center** offering after-school child care on campus with an emphasis on play. Children are given a healthy snack and have craft time, homework time, and a supervised outdoor activity.

**A City Swim Team** with pre-competitive swim sessions where children develop their swimming skills. Most city swim teams require that an applicant be deep water safe and able to swim 15 yards using a front or back dog paddle or underwater swimming (this is for young children 4-8 years old) or be deep water safe and able to swim 25 yards freestyle and kick 25 yards on their back (this is for older or more experienced children). Cost for the program we found was \$60 a month.

**Kids Fishing Derby** by one of Napa's business sponsors and a service club at Lake Hennessey. Started at 6:00 in the morning and ended at noon. Refreshments available. Each child needs an adult and fishing gear.

**School Sports Programs** - Cross County Running and Wrestling are two sports

that many children and youth enjoy through their neighborhood school.

Mondays focus on sports, beginning with basic warm-up exercises and then a sport adapted to the needs of the class. Wednesdays focus is on dance emphasizing the joy of movement and rhythm and the creation and performance of basic dances. There is also exploration of fundamental percussion instruments.
- There are also swim lessons available for special needs children who would like to have individualized instruction.
- All people with disabilities are also encouraged to participate in all other programs and activities available for preschoolers, teens and adults. Although they cannot design a program of activities specifically tailored to an individual's needs, they will make every attempt to make program accommodations.
- Cost:** Varies depending on activity. Residents of Benicia receive a discount.

**Program:** Fairfield offers a variety of recreational activities and programs throughout the year including a children's dance program, tot sports, youth sports, outdoor family activities, teen dances, and children's theatre to mention just a few. The "Life Before and After School Program" serves as a day care option for many families, while providing enriching social and recreational activities for school age children.

All people with disabilities are encouraged to participate in all programs and activities available for preschoolers, teens and adults. Although they cannot design a program of activities specifically tailored to an individual's needs, they will make every attempt to make program accommodations.

**Cost:** Varies depending on activity. Some income-based Youth Scholarships are available for up to \$300 per year.

Day programs like Alchemia and Vine Village are located in cities throughout Napa, Solano, and Sonoma Counties. These programs offer a combination of work and activity-based experiences to people with developmental disabilities who attend part time or full time. The social and recreational activities available through most day programs are available only to people who have applied and been accepted into the program. If vendored with North Bay Regional Center, NBRC funds the regular cost of the program; qualifying applicants must usually be at least 22 years old. Alchemia and Vine Village are two of the day programs that emphasize the arts as something people do for fun and for profit. For information about these programs, contact your Client Program Coordinator.

**Alchemia** is located in Petaluma, California. It is a non-profit organization committed to sharing the voice of those experiencing different abilities within their community through the arts and vocational experiences. Their theatrical and other performances are well known in the Bay area. Their creative & expressive arts include theater, dance, music, radio, television and creative writing. The Visual Arts involve painting, ceramics, drawing, and mixed media.

**Vine Village** is located just outside Napa, California. Art and the different expressions of art are its focus. This includes weaving, ceramics, painting, music, and specialty foods. Applicants must be able to function safely in a group setting and be able to eat and use the bathroom independently.
